Tim Smit KBE - Founder of the Eden Project

Tim is Chief Executive, Development and co-founder of the award winning Eden Project near St Austell in Cornwall. Eden began as a dream in 1995 and opened its doors to the public in 2000, since when over 13 million people have come to see what was once a sterile pit turned into a cradle of life containing world-class horticulture and startling architecture symbolic of human endeavour. Eden has contributed over £1 billion into the Cornish economy. Eden is proud of its success in changing people's perception of the potential for and application of science, by communicating and interpreting scientific concepts through the use of art, drama and storytelling as well as living up to its mission to take a pivotal role in local regeneration. It demonstrates once and for all that sustainability is not about sandals and nut cutlets, it is about good business practice and the citizenship values of the future.

Tim has received a variety of national awards including The Royal Society of Arts Albert Medal. In 2002 he was awarded an Honorary CBE in the New Years Honours List and in January 2011 he was appointed an honorary Knight Commander of the Most Excellent Order of the British Empire (KBE) by Her Majesty the Queen.

Workshops

Learning Conversation 1

Leading outstanding learning in an outstanding school, Ian Wilkinson, George Stephenson High School

This workshop will showcase our school's approach to developing outstanding learning and teaching. Delegates can find out how our staff worked collaboratively to improve and develop learning and teaching, resulting in our school being graded Outstanding earlier this year. We will discuss and share strategies in schools to further develop areas like collaborative learning, independent learning, differentiation, effective questioning and literacy.

Relevant to secondary particularly.

Learning Conversation 2

Surviving or thriving? How do teachers learn to develop an enquiry-based curriculum? Rachel Lofthouse, Newcastle University

In this discussion session I will share with colleagues some of the issues that teachers deal with when developing enquiry based curriculum, and invite you to do the same. A focus will be the ways that enquiry based curriculum forces teachers to deal with divergence, requiring enhanced flexibility and reactivity from teachers so that they can accommodate and account for unexpected outcomes. In our learning conversation we can expect a little divergence of our own.

Learning Conversation 3

Outdoor Learning: Realising the potential of your school grounds for outstanding learning and play, Anita Foster

On average children spend up to 25% of their time at school outdoors. The school grounds are potentially as important to the education and well-being of children as are the school buildings, but they are an often underused and undervalued resource. The quality of this outdoor space has a huge impact on children and young people, but it's not just about the design of the space – what you do with it is just as important as what you have in it. This conversation will consider some of the benefits of outdoor learning and play, and share ways of realising the potential of your school grounds to deliver outstanding learning.

Workshop 1

Singing Together: partnership, learning and impacting outcomes, Alice Witherow, Benton Park Primary School and Miles Wallis-Clarke, Hotspur

What can be learned from working in partnership to develop an area of learning that is not tested by a standardised test? How can this partnership impact on other areas of learning and what difference can it make for the outcomes for children? Please note. You will not be asked to sing!

Workshop 2

Parental Involvement for Raising Achievement, Charles Desforges and Julie McGrane

In this session Professor Charles Desforges will share research evidence about what methods of parental involvement impact pupil achievement. This will help your school develop a parental involvement strategy that's likely to impact outcomes. Julie McGrane will then share a variety of practical tools and strategies you can use with parents.

Relevant to primary or secondary.

Workshop 3

Thinking through Enquiry, Anne de A'Echevarria

This workshop will aim to share a variety of ideas and strategies that:

- Help make thinking dispositions and skills visible and learnable
- Support the development of a shared language for talking about skills and habits of mind
- Introduce students to thinking tools and strategies that help them explore what it means to enquire and be enquirers

Relevant to all phases, though particularly helpful to those close to practice.

Workshop 4

Challenge & Differentiation, Julie McGrane & Hilary Caisley

This workshop will share a range of practical tools and professional learning strategies you can use to develop challenge and differentiation practice in your school. We will give you ideas of tools to trial in the classroom, share experience of developing practice across school and consider how to nurture pupils to take on challenging activities.

Workshop 6

Assessment to Support Purposeful Learning, Jonathan Parkinson and Julie Roberts, St Thomas More High School, Gateshead

This workshop will share a possible model for purposeful learning in lessons, starting from the premise that the only model of Teaching and Learning that teachers use on a minute by minute basis is the personal one that they have in their head and discuss different opportunities for assessment throughout the lesson by looking at different examples of successful practice that have been used by teachers in St Thomas More Catholic School.

Relevant to secondary phases particularly but does have relevance for the upper end of key stage 2.

Space Matters, Richard Wise, Ryder architects
